

Carbon Monoxide

If you have questions about carbon monoxide please call us. Don't wait for symptoms to appear. The most common signs of carbon monoxide poisoning are headache, weakness, dizziness, upset stomach, vomiting, chest pain and confusion.

Do not go back inside until the source of the leak is shut off or repaired



Carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless gas that can kill you. It can be hard to tell the difference between minor carbon monoxide symptoms and the flu.



Carbon monoxide is found in fumes produced any time you burn fuel in cars, stoves, grills, gas ranges, small engines, and fireplaces.



Carbon monoxide is most often produced by clogged chimneys, space heaters, cracked furnace exchangers, or leaving a car running in the garage, even if the garage door is open.



All homes should have a carbon monoxide detector placed at bed level near sleeping areas. Additional detectors should be put on each floor of the house.



If your detector begins to sound have everyone leave the building. Seek help if anyone has moderate or severe symptoms, history of heart problems or is pregnant.



Carbon monoxide detectors should not be placed within 15 inches of heating or cooking appliances or in a humid area, such as a bathroom.
